Of the 11 seniors hoping to enter an apprenticeship 9 have been officially hired and will be starting as early as the Monday after graduation, the other two individuals run their own lawn care business and will be seeking out an apprenticeship at the end of the summer.

Early Childhood Education

This has been an exciting year for the Early Childhood Education Pathway. **Level one** students were able to take part in fieldwork two days a week, spending time with infants, tod-dlers, and preschoolers. The fieldwork experience allowed students to apply what they learned about child development and early childhood education classrooms in real time, building relationships with young children and their early childhood educators within local early childhood education programs. Students who will be 18 years old and will graduate have job offers for the summer, and beyond, if they are interested.

The **level two** students have completed Vt. Early Childhood Education Pre-Apprenticeship program, each recording at least one hundred hours of fieldwork. These students will continue their studies in Early Childhood Education next year in college. Congratulations Paige, Anna, and Kiran. The level two students have completed their capstone project with an in-depth assessment of the competencies they have acquired over the past two school years as well as a reflection on what early childhood educator values and dispositions they have polished. The capstone project is presented as a 20-30 minute oral presentation.

Business:

Business 1 and Foundations of Career Exploration classes have been busy wrapping up our personal finance and microeconomics units. We have explored opening bank accounts, loans, mortgages, paying taxes, creating retirement savings, and even how to finance higher education. With the help of the Next Generation Personal Finance curriculum and the Everfi game-based learning modules, the students have experienced firsthand doing these tasks.

Forestry:

The Forestry/Natural Resources class has just finished their logging and timber stand improvement (TSI) project at the Brattleboro Pleasant Valley Watershed. The forest is managed for water quality and future tree harvesting. Logs were transported with our new grapple trailer back to school to be milled.






Construction and Architecture
